Binding a quilt by Machine on both sides

Methods:

- 1. Sew to back and flip to front with standard binding
 - a. Blanket stitch
 - b. Top / edge stitch
- 2. Sew to back and flip to fron with Faux piped binding
- 3. Sew to front and flip to back



Method 1 Instructions (Sew to back and flip to front with standard binding):

- 1. Make your binding with 2 ¼" strips as usual (straight of grain is fine unless you have curves, then you must use bias binding).
 - ✓ TIP: Starching your binding will help a lot to keep nice looking corners.
- 2. OPTIONAL: Sew a basting line 1/8" around the edge of your quilt. This isn't required but it will help prevent tucks / pleats as you sew your binding on.
- 3. Sew your binding to the BACK of your quilt with a ¼" seam allowance.
 - ✓ TIP: I like to use a walking foot to help move all the layers EVENLY.
- 4. Join the ends of your binding as normal and sew down.
- 5. From the back of your quilt PRESS the binding away from the quilt.
- 6. Flip the quilt over and press your binding to the front of the quilt.
- 7. Sew down the front of the quilt with top stitch, blanket stitch or decorative stitches.
 - ✓ TIP: You can use clips or a thin line of Elmers white glue to hold down the binding, or you can just hold it in place as you stitch.
- 8. When you reach the corner make sure to nicely fold your miter. You can use a stiletto to help hold it in place as you sew.
 - ✓ TIP: On the corners make sure your miter corner fold on the front is the opposite direction as the miter corner on the back. This will reduce bulk and make a nicer looking corner.
- Turn the corner and repeat until done.
